# SmaRT-Ethiopia Program: Partners and actors landscaping report

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# 1 Introduction

For the implementation of the Ethiopia priority country program on Small Ruminant Value Chain Transformation (SmaRT-Ethiopia), national partners play a key role in all research and development activities. The Theory of Change developed for the SmaRT program also requires direct involvement of or strong relationships with a very diverse set of actors along the small ruminant (SR) value chain. In the past, the SmaRT team sporadically reviewed partners and actors in the SR value chain but we did not go through a more formal exercise. The objective of the present landscaping report was to review and update our list of partners and actors, their roles and reflect on our relationships. Based on this review, we also aimed at developing a partnership engagement plan with concrete actions to be taken.

# 2 Process

We invited a small number of key persons involved or associated with the SmaRT program and met twice for half a day on 26<sup>th</sup> August and 28<sup>th</sup> August 2019. The meeting was facilitated by Helen Altshul, CRP Livestock Performance and Partnership Manager. The participants included Barbara Rischkowsky (ICARDA), Getachew Legese Feye (ILRI), Jane Wamatu (ICARDA), Mamusha Lemma Woldegiorgis, (ILRI), Siboniso Moyo, (ILRI), and Tesfaye Getachew Mengistu (ICARDA). The participants split into two groups: one group reviewed national level partners and actors and the other group worked on the local level. On the first day, key institutes, partners and actors were identified, and their roles briefly described. In addition, the current relationships with the partners and actors were scored as positive, neutral, mixed, challenging or non-existent. The scoring helped to inform the partners and actors engagement strategy that was developed by the same groups on the second day.

# 3 Results

Key partners and actors at the nation level and their roles are listed in Table 1, local level partners and actors in Table 3. The preliminary engagement plan for the national level is presented in Table 2 and for the local level in Table 4. The participating resource persons did not know enough about the forage sector; therefore, this area needs to be reviewed with CIAT and ILRI staff active in forage research. An ongoing scoping study on microfinance institutions will help to complete the information in the table. ILRI's Impact at scale Unit is looking into suppliers of entrepreneurial training which is an important requirement for transforming smallholder SR production into more business-oriented enterprises. This report should be considered a 'living document' which needs to be frequently updated and revisited. To actively pursue the ambitious engagement plans, they need to be continuously revised and compared to what has been achieved.

Furthermore, the findings presented here only present the view and perception of the ICARDA/ILRI SmaRT team and needs to be counter-checked at least with our key partners. To this end, we need to consider if we should conduct partner health checks.
